

1 Point Perspective

One point perspective is a relatively easy way of creating the illusion of space in a work of art. It was “discovered” in the early 15th century.

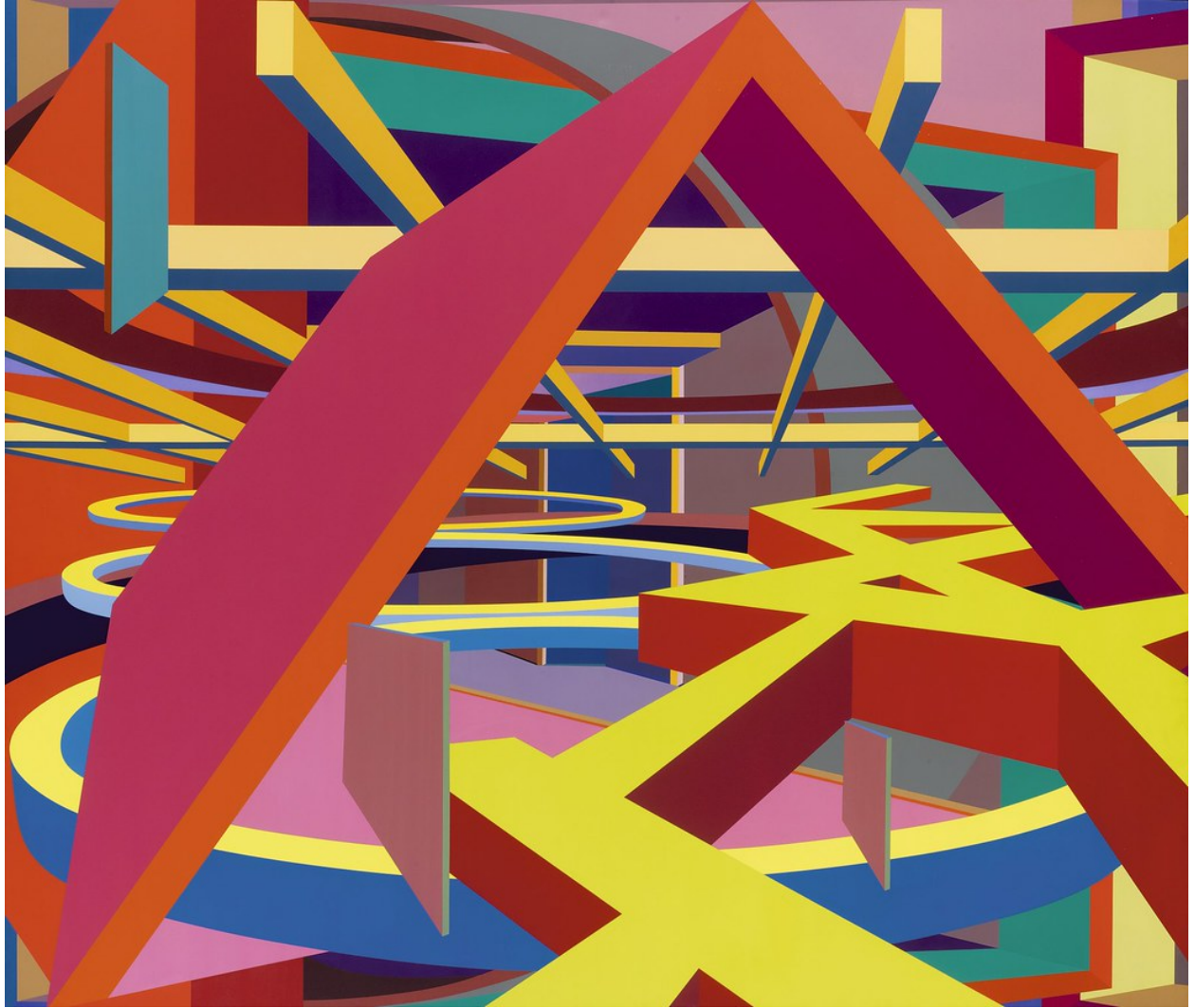
For **Part 1** of this Sketchbook assignment, you will be creating 21 cubes in space, with 7 of the cubes above the horizon, 7 on the horizon line, and 7 below the horizon line.

Part 2 of this sketchbook assignment will be you demonstrating your understanding of one point perspective in a project of your choosing. I encourage you to incorporate colour, tone, or line into your piece. **KEEP IT SIMPLE!**

This may be completed in your sketchbook, or on a separate sheet of paper. You may incorporate any medium you wish (watercolour, graphite, pencil crayons)

Make sure your name is on your work, and each part of the assignment is labeled part 1 or part 2.
